- -Capture a collection of 80-100 photographs per ICAP site visited. A site may include a single clinical setting, an ICAP office, or other predetermined location or focus area.
- -Package high resolution jpeg or raw files of photos (300 dpi at 2610 x 3900 pixels) captured into External Hard-disk or an accessible online cloud storage site, such as DropBox. Photos should be well-organized into folders and easily accessible.
- -Each photo should be edited, if needed, for strong visual impact.
- -Each photo should contain metadata with standard captions, including where photos were taken, and other relevant tagging information.
- -All photos should have variations, including horizontal and vertical photos of same subjects; dramatic angles; closeup, midrange and wide-
